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JOHN 18-21

Only one of Jesus' closest followers dared call himself "the beloved disciple." John used this description of himself not because he thought he was the favourite, or better than the others; but because he could hardly believe the gracious love and humility of God that allowed him to see and know the Son of God, Jesus Christ, in the flesh. You cannot read John's gospel without something of the same sense of amazement.

The last four chapters of the gospel are full of searching questions (over 30) as Jesus finishes the work God the Father sent him to accomplish. Questions of identity and power, of truth and love, of love and hate, and above all, of faith and unbelief. John does not want us to stop at amazement; nor to just experience "faith." He wants us to believe something and so have life, eternal life.

This is very different from the vague and misleading encouragements to merely "believe" or to just "have faith." Far more important than the quality of our faith is the object of our faith: he wants us to "believe that." This is why John writes.

these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name. (20:31)

READ, MARK, LEARN, AND INWARDLY DIGEST

INTRODUCTION – The steps of these studies are designed to:

- help us to understand more fully what is being said in this Gospel;
- enable us to see how each passage bears on the circumstances of our lives;
- assist us to pray the Scriptures into our lives through the meditation on God's word.

READ

1. Read the passage. Pray for God to draw you to himself and aid you in understanding as you read, also praying that he will transform you by his Spirit (You cannot do this without his help!)

MARK

2. Mark up the printed text.

a) Ask yourself: What kind of literature is this (genre)? Though mainly narrative and teaching, the Gospels are a mixture of literature. Is this passage narrative, teaching, parable, a list, or apocalyptic? It is common sense that each kind of literature is to be read differently. (e.g. Parables and apocalyptic use more figurative language than historical narrative.)

In a *narrative* passage ask the following questions.

- Characters Who are the main people? How do they relate to each other?
- Contrasts and parallels in characters and actions and decisions.
- Timing Note when something is happening and how time passes. Is the timing of an event significant?
- Geography Where is the event happening? Note any significance of the setting.
- Dialogue What is being said and by whom? Who is the audience? What does it accomplish in the passage?
- Narrator's comments notice them. They often explain what is actually happening.

In a *parable* ask the following questions, if applicable.

- To whom is Jesus speaking?
- In what context is he telling it? Where? When? Why? Is it in answer to someone's question?
- Using any clues given in the text or other biblical sources, assign the earthly elements/characters/objects to their spiritual counterparts. (e.g. What is the seed? What is the vineyard? What is the treasure?)

b) Underline the words that are repeated, very important, or unclear. Note:

- any words that connect ideas, like "therefore" near the beginning of sentences.
- repetition of words, phrases, or themes ...and contrasts
- 'Big Bible' words (especially OT references or allusions e.g: Passover, salvation, promise)
- surprises or things that don't make sense.

LEARN

3. Context

Immediate context:

- What comes immediately before and directly after this text?
- How does what comes before influence the meaning of this text?
- Is this passage part of a larger section of teaching?

Book context:

• How does the main theme of the entire book inform the meaning of your specific text?

4. Structure

Work on the structure or shape of the passage. This skill can be hard at first but is very rewarding! Try breaking it into the smaller parts that belong together. Look for patterns and note them for emphasis and shape clues, and ask: are there words or phrases that act as *bookends* (i.e. words that begin and end a section)?

Ask what the shape tells you about the meaning of the passage. There are several ways of analyzing the structure of a narrative passage:

a) Scenes

Narrative can be structured around scenes. Identify each scene in your passage, noting the verse and write down a description for each scene.

b) Plot

Another way to structure narrative may be around the plot of what is happening in the passage. Often, three parts to the plot are:

- Problem and/or tension
- Turning Point
- Resolution

c) Dialogue

Some passages are structured around dialogue. Note how that shapes the text.

PRAYER

8. This question will ask you to turn the things that God has addressed into prayer and share it with your prayer triplet or group. Pray for God to do his work of transformation in you. Remember you cannot change yourself...we are too weak for that! Praying is an acknowledgement of your real need and weakness in all spiritual things.

Study 7 – John 21:1-25

1. READ - Pray for God to draw you to himself and help you to understand as you read.

2. MARK - Mark up the printed text.

Note words of interest. (e.g. repetitions, contrasts, connecting words, 'big Bible' words, surprises). After you have made your observations, think through how these observations impact what is being said. Share what you have found with your group.

21:1 After this Jesus revealed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias, and he revealed himself in this way.

2 Simon Peter, Thomas (called the Twin), Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples were together.

3 Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing."

They said to him, "We will go with you."

They went out and got into the boat,

but that night they caught nothing.

4 Just as day was breaking, Jesus stood on the shore;

yet the disciples did not know that it was Jesus.

5 Jesus said to them, "Children, do you have any fish?"

They answered him, "No."

6 He said to them, "Cast the net on the right side of the boat, and you will find some."

So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in,

because of the quantity of fish.

7 That disciple whom Jesus loved therefore said to Peter, "It is the Lord!"

When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord,

he put on his outer garment, for he was stripped for work,

and threw himself into the sea.

8 The other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish,

for they were not far from the land,

but about a hundred yards off.

9 When they got out on land, they saw a charcoal fire in place,

with fish laid out on it, and bread.

10 Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught."

11 So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore,

full of large fish, 153 of them.

And although there were so many, the net was not torn.

12 Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast."

Now none of the disciples dared ask him, "Who are you?"

They knew it was the Lord.

13 Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and so with the fish.

14 This was now the third time that Jesus was revealed to the disciples

after he was raised from the dead.

15 When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter,

"Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?"

He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you."

He said to him, "Feed my lambs."

16 He said to him a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?"

He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you."

He said to him, "Tend my sheep."

17 He said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was grieved because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" and he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep.

18 Truly, truly, I say to you,

when you were young, you used to dress yourself and walk wherever you wanted, but when you are old, you will stretch out your hands,

and another will dress you and carry you where you do not want to go."

19 (This he said to show by what kind of death he was to glorify God.)

And after saying this he said to him, "Follow me."

20 Peter turned and saw the disciple whom Jesus loved following them, the one who also had leaned back against him during the supper and had said, "Lord, who is it that is going to betray you?"

21 When Peter saw him, he said to Jesus, "Lord, what about this man?"

22 Jesus said to him,

"If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you? You follow me!"

23 So the saying spread abroad among the brothers that this disciple was not to die; yet Jesus did not say to him that he was not to die,

but, "If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you?"

24 This is the disciple who is bearing witness about these things, and who has written these things,

and we know that his testimony is true.

25 Now there are also many other things that Jesus did.

Were every one of them to be written,

I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be written.

3. LEARN - <i>Context</i> - How does the context inform your understanding? Immediate context:
4. Structure or shape of the passage. Try breaking the passage into smaller parts that belong
together. The structure often shapes the <i>emphasis</i> of the passage. (There are various ways of analyzing the structure of a narrative passage: e.g. break the text into scenes, or follow the plot line or the dialogue.)
5. What does it all mean? - What do we learn about the person and identity of Christ? What do we learn about why Christ has come (his mission)?

6. Clarify - In one sentence, write down the main idea (big idea) in the passage.
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
